## Wheels of Italy in Minnesota

The Midwest is not a flashy place. We are America's Heartland, not America's Jazz Hands. Our humble stock balks at the suggestion of ostentation. So this is the last place you would expect to see a gathering of sexy Italian super-vehicles...but in the pioneer spirit of the locale, a group of hearty Midwestern Italia enthusiasts have built a show that's as much guts as it is glory...and stumbling upon it in Minneapolis' August humidity might be the weirdest experience of your summer short of finding crop circles in your back forty...

About three years ago, Dan Schaefer and Phill Slavik ran into each other at a local British car show, both there with Italian cars; one Alfa, one Fiat. "We had to piggyback on other events," explained Dan, "There were no shows for Italian cars." They exchanged contact information, and a couple days later were on the phone, planning an Italian show of their own.

It's not that an Italian car show in Minnesota hadn't occurred to anyone before. There had been some attempts to unite the diverse group of Italia enthusiasts, but the problem was, no single make or model had enough devotees to get anything significant going. And at first blush, the Modena and the Jolly are pretty different. Would those two owners have anything to say to one another?

Not to mention the fact that it's Minnesota; a north-mid-western state with winter nine months of the year. Spread the cost of a Lambo over twelve months of driving in Scottsdale or Miami; no big deal, but try to cram it into the three or four good months we have here? Not quite such a bargain. Show organizers wondered if people even have exotic cars here. And if they did, would they want to bring them out to a little show, with no reputation, and no big trophy giveaway, to talk to the owners of vastly different vehicles that just happen to have the same nation of origin?

Fourteen months later it was happening. In the meantime Phill and Dan had joined forces with Christopher Brooder (the only member




of the group who claims any Italian heritage), and put together a website. Establishing the name and the shows' parameters were difficult tasks. Initially it was to be a car show, but then all the fantastic Italian motorcycles would be left out. In the spirit of inclusion the three titled the show "Wheels of Italy," and opened the doors to cars, trucks, motorcycles, bicycles, and any other wheeled Italian vehicles (including someday, Phill hopes, a Lamborghini tractor).

The week before the first show, Wheels of Italy had forty registered Italian vehicles. The day of the show itself, and much to the relief of the planners, 100 additional entrants arrived, lured by the gleaming red and yellow cars already parked in the lot beside Lake Calhoun.

By the end of the day there had been a surprising twenty-five Ferraris in attendance, ten more than the local club knew about, in addition to Lamborghinis, Alfa Romeos, Fiats, Maseratis, Ducatis, Moto

The character of the Midwestern Italia enthusiast is unique and unpredictable. In addition to the shorter driving season, there aren't as many collectors who've had experience with Italian vehicles. Namely, the nostalgia factor is less influential, as very few people grew up with Italian cars in their lives. The resulting group of collectors are drawn to Italia for its undeniable style; the art of its design. Enthusiasm for these esoteric qualities lends itself easily to an appreciation of many different makes and models.

The Wheels of Italy show is friendly to makes of differing national origins; it has become something of a destination for car clubs of many varieties. It's not uncommon to see equally rare and interesting British, German, American and Japanese cars in the lot, but the real action is happening inside the gates.

Practically speaking, Wheels of Italy is the most accessible show of the season. A stated goal of the originators is to host a vehicle show unlike any other. It is non-judged, to encourage attendance for everything from Ferraris to Fiats. Dan noted the mission of Wheels of Italy is to "support the community of Italia enthusiasts, rather than award individuals." And it's free, which encourages



the presence of participants with cars, but also spectator enthusiasts, those described as "admirers" by www.wheelsofitaly.com.

It promises to be an excellent show once again this year, with sponsors including local Italian restaurants, performance shops, cycle dealers and more. 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
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# Meadow Brook Concours / Italian Happening

-The bottom of the car, wheel wells, and the engine are completely spotless; having a hoist has allowed me keep the entire car spotless.

-Just installed a stainless steel Quick Silver exhaust, the original is included with the car.

The purchase of my white Diablo roadster is the only reason this one has to go, a decision which took me well over enough to make, but I decided that I just don't need two white Diablo's.





# Technical Talk - Countach / Diablo Clutches

With all the talk/rumors/misinformation there is about the Diablo and Countach clutches, I thought a short write-up on my experience would be valuable to others when their time comes for a new clutch. Unfortunately for me, my Diablo clutch failed mid summer this year requiring me to dig right in and find out what it was all about so I could have my car back on the road for more driving before the cold weather hit. Initially I thought my clutch failed due to wear, but I wasn't exactly sure because the clutch was installed by the previous owner. Therefore, I had only an idea as to how long the clutch was in the car. After the shop removed the engine from my Diablo and pulled the pressure plate, it was clear that the clutch failed due to poor manufacturing; the clutch lining had separated from the clutch disk itself. I also learned that my clutch was an aftermarket carbon fiber version, which I did not know. This failure occurred from poor bonding of the lining and disk (from talking to friends in automotive power train and to clutch manufacturers, the clutch lining and disk should never separate under any circumstances, even abuse). To my surprise, I was not the only one to have experienced this problem, after telling friends in the Lamborghini community about what I had found, a few of them told me that they had the same problem. (See the photos on the opposite page)

At first I had thought about replacing it with another carbon fiber clutch because the wear looked normal and the clutch seemed to perform as expected. But after noticing the carbon fiber buildup on my crank sensor, I decided against the going with another carbon fiber clutch and looking into other options. Since the carbon fiber material contained metal, the dust was picked up by my crank sensor (which is magnetic) as it wore; this sensor is what provides a reference signal for fuel injection and spark on the Diablo. This dust on the crank sensor created erratic operation of the engine at high rpm, which I had originally thought was a different problem, but it was solved with just cleaning the crank sensor. See the photos below. This dust problem is not applicable to the Countach however since its sensor is located up at the distributor.

So with carbon fiber out of the picture, I had a few different choices to consider, organic (which is a typical OEM material), kevlar (which is a material newer to clutch application), and some proprietary materials. The organic material was out of the question because of how fast it wears, kevlar was getting nothing but good feedback from everyone I asked, but the proprietary materials were still foggy. Spec Clutch and OS Giden, who are both known for quality clutches both offered a proprietary clutch material blend that did include carbon fiber, but said they had never seen problems with the crank sensor. These two clutches looked much tougher than stock and also had great reviews from people who have used them; but I never wanted to worry about the carbon fiber build up issue again, so I ended up going with kevlar. The kevlar is also tough but doesn't leave me worrying about the crank sensor collecting debris. At the time of writing this I already have 750 miles on the clutch and it feels great, so we will see what happens!
